### **TRUSTEES' REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2007**

#### **Objects and Membership**

The British International Studies Association was founded over thirty years ago. The objectives of the Association are to promote the development and study of International Studies and to encourage education and the advancement of learning in the subject area both in the UK and elsewhere. It is also an objective to publish a scholarly journal and other such publications and to organise an annual conference.

Membership of the Association is open to any person interested in promoting the purposes of the Association. There are different categories of membership such as postgraduate membership and corporate membership. Fees may be varied for those who are unemployed or those who have retired. At the end of 2007 membership stood at 903. Most are based within the British Isles.

The Association is a registered charity.

The terms 'Association' and 'Charity' refer to British International Studies Association.

#### **Trustees and Governance.**

The Trustees of the Association are the Executive Committee and the Officers of the Association. There are currently 11 elected members of the Executive. The officers are the Chair, the Vice Chair, Secretary, and the Treasurer; elections for all posts are held at the AGM (held at the annual conference) and are open to full members.

The Executive also consists of representatives from the student body, without voting rights, who are elected by student members at the AGM. In addition, a representative from the ESRC, the Foreign and Commonwealth Office, the PSA as well as the editors of the Review of International Studies, the CUP/BISA book series, the BISA newsletter and the school liaison officer attend the quarterly meetings of the Executive in a non voting capacity. The Association reserves the right to co-opt further additional members as it deems appropriate and to reflect the discipline in the various parts of the British Isles.

The Trustees and Members of the Executive Committee are listed on page 1. The Association has a President (Professor Caroline Kennedy-Pipe from the University of Warwick) and a number of Vice Presidents who were formerly Chairs of BISA and eminent figures with an interest in the development and well being of the Association. Past chairs may assist the Association in a number of ways such as providing advice, serving as judges for awards and for raising funds.

The Association seeks the advice of its accountants Slater Johnstone and its solicitors, Wake Smith when considered necessary.

#### **The Review of International Studies.**

The Association publishes a major scholarly journal, the Review of International Studies in conjunction with Cambridge University Press. The journal was based at the University of Exeter under the Editorship of Professor David Armstrong but as of January 2006, with the agreement of Cambridge University Press, the journal moved to the School of International Relations at the University of St Andrews. The Editor is Professor Nick Rengger and the Assistant is Ms Mary Kettle. The Editorial team consists of Professor Oliver Richmond, Dr Ian Taylor, Dr Rick Fawn, Dr Alison Watson, and Dr Ben Thirkell-White. The journal is overseen by an Editorial Advisory Board which includes the Chair of the Association. All members of the Association receive copies of the Review of International Studies. It is available to libraries and other institutions. Publishing deals by consortiums and libraries are of crucial importance to the financial welfare of the association.

#### **Studies in International Relations**

During 2005, officers of the Executive began to scrutinise the terms and conditions of the book series 'Studies in International Relations' which is a joint venture between the Association and Cambridge University Press. After prolonged consultation amongst the officers and the past chairs, the Association agreed in 2006 a new contract with CUP and a new editorial team of Professor Chris Reus-Smit (ANU, Canberra) and Professor Nick Wheeler (Aberystwyth University) was approved. A new editorial advisory board is in the final stages of approval with the full input of the Executive. The book series provides a minor source of income for the Association, but is widely seen as one of the leading series in the world and therefore adds to the international standing of BISA.

#### **BISA Newsletter.**

The Association publishes a newsletter four times a year. This, along with the website and an email list, is a major channel of communication within the Association. The newsletter is edited and produced by Dr Vanessa Pupavac of the University of Nottingham. It usually includes a number of short articles on international studies, news of appointments and publications and news from working groups and workshops undertaken by the BISA membership. It also carries articles that may be of interest to the scholarly association. The BISA website also carries news of the Association. The email list, operated out of the University of Birmingham, provides a platform for members to exchange information on forthcoming conferences/seminars/workshops as well as employment opportunities.

#### **Annual Association Conference, Working Groups and Schools Liaison.**

BISA hosts an annual conference for its membership as well as funding a range of specialist working groups and workshops. Grants may be awarded for these activities. The Association subsidises postgraduate attendance at the annual conference but also sponsors a number of students, fellows, and international academics to attend the annual meeting. A management group, MSG runs the conference. This arrangement was reviewed in 2007 and a new, three year contract agreed. The Association also runs a schools initiative, run by Dr Bela Aurora of Swansea University.

#### **Prizes**

The Association awards prizes for the best article published in the Review of International Studies, a best doctoral thesis prize and from 2006 runs the Founders Fund to help postgraduate students complete pieces of doctoral work. The Founders Fund is overseen by the Trustees and administered Dr Kim Hutchings of LSE (BISA Treasurer). The Executive has examined the manner in which prizes are awarded and, under the initiative of the Vice Chair (Professor Stuart Croft, University of Warwick) agreed new rules and procedures. The Executive has also agreed a new award for the best book published in a calendar year by a member. The Chair will be approaching the family of a leading figure in British International Relations, Professor Susan Strange, to ask their permission that the prize be named after her as the 'BISA Susan Strange Book Prize'.

#### **Consultation.**

During the last year, efforts have been made to ensure the representation of the Association and the interests of its membership in all aspects of higher education policy. The Association has continued to work closely with the PSA to express its views over the funding of research in the social sciences and specifically over the RAE, both the current exercise and proposals for future assessments. The Association also took an active role in the ESRC initiative to benchmark research in Politics and International Studies. BISA co-sponsored the international benchmarking exercise with the ESRC and PSA and was represented on the steering group. The benchmarking panel visited the UK in January 2007 and its report was accepted by the steering group in the summer. The report was, in general, extremely positive over the international standing of international studies in the UK; its few reservations are being examined and in particular its concerns over gender representation in the profession are being examined by a committee established by the Chair.

#### **Administration**

For much of its existence administration of the Association has been handled by Mrs Pauline Kelly. Mrs Kelly indicated her intention to retire during 2006 and the executive consulted over how best to replace her. The Executive decided that a part time administrator was required and agreed to a proposal from Aberystwyth University that the post should be housed there for an initial 3 year period (at no additional cost to the Association). The new administrator is Gail Birkett. A handover period was agreed for part of 2007 when the Association would continue to employ Pauline Kelly.

#### **Income and Expenditure during financial year.**

These are detailed in the financial statements.

#### **Reserves, Investments and Risks.**

On the advice of the Association's accountants, an appropriate reserve level has been determined to be in the order of £100,000.

Like any organisation, BISA faces various risks, mainly of a financial nature. The largest risk lies in terms of income generation or income failure. It is possible, but we judge unlikely that income from the publications of the Association could fall from current levels. We have tried to safeguard against this through the insertion of a 'minimum amount' payable clause in the contract with CUP. It could be thought that subscription levels to the journal could fall, that CUP might as a company fail or that CUP might terminate its arrangements with the association. However the Association does own the journal and this does provide the Association with the right to end the agreement should any of these conditions seem likely to threaten the financial health of the Association. However, aware of the risks involved the Executive has begun to examine the possibility of a second journal and other activities to broaden the income stream.

It is possible that the level of membership will reduce, thus leading to a fall in income from that stream. It is also possible that various corporate donors to the annual conference will fail to donate at the level of previous years.

The Management group, MSG might fail to meet its commitment in administering the annual conference. Although the Association now keeps tight control of incoming funds for the conference in their own accounts, MSG itself might fail. Therefore keeping the commitment to a fixed sum, payable after the conference is a crucial part of maintaining control of conference costs. The decision taken previously by other officers of the association to run the conference at a loss has been replaced with a break even strategy. This strategy was successful with the annual 2005 conference at St Andrews University and 2006 conference at Cork.

It is also the case that risks accrue from possible over spending by the Association or by officers/employees of the Association. Although the Association keep relatively tight control of its financial spending, it has been necessary to increase the level of expenditure on administration to cover the handover between Pauline Kelly and Gail Birkett. We are currently looking at the costs of insuring the Association and its officers.

There is a risk that legal action could be brought against the Association and the appointment of Wake Smith solicitors in 2004 helps militate against just such a risk. They advise on all employment matters.

Finally, there is a risk of illness to the administrative officers of the Association. Illness or accident to the BISA administrator may require additional support to be hired. We are currently reviewing our administrative arrangements to ensure that the Association is not exposed in this manner.

### **STATEMENT OF TRUSTEES RESPONSIBILITIES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2007**

### **INDEPENDENT EXAMINER'S REPORT TO THE TRUSTEES OF THE BRITISH INTERNATIONAL STUDIES ASSOCIATION**

I report on the financial statements of the British International Studies Association for the year ended 31 March 2007, which are set out on pages 7 to 12.

#### **Respective responsibilities of the members and examiner**

The Charity's Trustees are responsible for the preparation of the accounts. The Charity's Trustees consider that an audit is not required for this year (under section 43 (2) of the Charities Act 1993 (the 1993 Act) and that an independent examination is required.

It is my responsibility to:

- examine the accounts (under section 43(3)(a) of the 1993 Act);
- follow the procedures laid down in the General Directions given by the Charity Commissioners (under section 43 (7) (b) of the 1993 Act); and
- to state whether particular matters have come to our attention.

#### **Basis of independent examiner's report**

My examination was carried out in accordance with the General Directions given by the Charity Commissioners. An examination includes a review of the accounting records kept by the Charity and a comparison of the accounts presented with those records. It also includes consideration of any unusual items or disclosures in the accounts and seeking explanation from you as managers concerning any such matters. The procedures undertaken do not provide all the evidence that would be required in an audit, and consequently I do not express an audit opinion on the view given by the accounts.

## NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2007

### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### Accounting basis and standards

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention. They have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities' issued in March 2005, applicable Accounting Standards and the Charities Act 1993.

#### Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the Statement of Financial Activities when the Charity becomes legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy.

#### Resources expended

All expenditure is accounted for on the accruals basis, inclusive of any value added tax that cannot be recovered.

#### Taxation

The Charity is exempt from taxation on its ordinary activities.

#### Fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are shown at cost including irrecoverable value added tax, less depreciation. Depreciation is calculated to write down the cost of each asset, less the estimated residual value, over its expected useful life, as follows:
